Legislative Focus #1:

Resiliency & Sustainability

- Florida ranks first in the country with \$116B in weather related damages.
- Critical community-wide investments in resilient infrastructure include beach renourishment, sand dune raising, new seawall construction, and implementing flood-proof building structures.
- Cities are planning multiphase approaches to address stormwater storage, water quality, beach renourishment, and flood abatement.
- Recognize doing nothing is just buying time: spend \$13B now or lose \$81B later

Costs of Doing Municipal Business

In delivering robust services to our communities, municipalities typically:

- Pay the majority of costs shared with counties to provide certified firefighters and EMS, wastewater, stormwater, and reclaimed water treatment.
- Use private contractors to provide a majority of residential solid waste and recycling services.
- Pay the majority of costs shared with private contractors to provide business solid waste removal service.
- Split costs with counties to provide sworn police and school resource officers.

Traffic/Transportation

 Traffic congestion and public transportation remain stalwart obstacles to growth and health of our cities.



Long commute times interfere with productivity and overall quality of life.

- Public transportation issue remains one of the region's greatest challenges.
- The region must have a powerful voice to solve its transportation needs with one goal: to improve mobility, connectivity and transit options.



Economic Diversification

 Nearly one in four business and information services firms in Florida call the Suncoast Region home including some of the top names in banking, finance and insurance.



 Legislators must continue to prioritize efforts to develop and sustain a thriving local economy by focusing on the attraction, expansion and retention of high wage jobs and capital investment.



Housing

 According to the National Low Income Housing Coalition, a person working an \$11 hour

minimum wage job would have to work 92 hours a week to afford a one-bedroom rental in the region.

 An individual renter needs to earn at least \$85,000 annually to pay rent and live comfortably in the region. Average income in region is well below that at \$57,500. \$85K
